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Abstract

This study explored beliefs teachers held about different methods, theories, and different types of assessment and content of English course books in high schools in Iran. It tried to find also if there is any relationship between teachers' beliefs about ELT theories and methods and their knowledge of current theories and methods and to find also whether strong relationships exist between their beliefs and the place they are teaching. The study was implemented among a population of 300 high school English language teachers in three Kurdish speaking provinces in Iran. An 80 item questionnaire was used to get teachers' beliefs and for correlation purpose, a knowledge test was designed based on a pilot study conducted earlier. Findings revealed that subjects agreed with current theories and methods of language teaching and learning, although they strongly disagreed with some concepts and techniques of theories and methods such as priority of speech over other skills, emphasis on meaning rather than form and error tolerance. The findings also showed that they strongly favored using mother tongue, translation, and deductive application of teaching grammar. Interview, essay test, open ended questions and multiple choice test were among the favorite types of assessment cited by teachers in the study. There were also beliefs challenging the content of current English course books such as writing and speaking parts. Findings indicated that teachers who held strong beliefs toward some theories and methods had high knowledge on related theory and methods and pointed out to some significant relationship. The place they were teaching showed to have no effect on their beliefs.
